### Week I: He is the Word.

**John 1:1-2** 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning.'

This week we consider Jesus' divine nature and his eternal existence.

### Week 2: He is the Creator.

John 1:3 'Through him all things were made;

without him nothing was made that has been made.'

This week, we look at Jesus' creative power and authority over the entire universe, highlighting his pre-eminence in all of creation.

## Week 3: He is Life.

John 1:4 'In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind'.

This week, we explore Jesus' role as the giver and sustainer of life, offering spiritual and eternal life to all who believe in him.

## Week 4: He is Light.

**John I:5** 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.'

This week, we look at Jesus' role as the one who brings light... the one who dispels the darkness of sin.

## Christmas Day: He is Immanuel.

John 1:14 'The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.' Today, we celebrate the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ, highlighting the intimate presence of God among us and the fulfilment of divine promises through the birth of Jesus.

# He is the Word.

John 1:1-2, John 1:11 and John 8:58

'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning' (John 1:1-2).

As we enter Advent, waiting and preparing for the celebration of the birth of Jesus, preparing our hearts for Christmas, the words of St. John 1:1-2 declare to us the divine nature and the eternal existence of Jesus, who came to 'pitch his tent' among us.

The Jewish people were waiting for the Messiah to come. And when he finally came, just as had been predicted, they did not recognise Jesus as the Messiah: 'He came to his own and his own did not receive him' (John 1:11).

When we look at the four Gospels and how they introduce Jesus, the first three each place Jesus in a historical context. Matthew starts with a long list of descendants, connecting Jesus to King David and back to Abraham. Mark introduces Jesus through the preaching of John the Baptist. Luke goes a little further back and begins with Elizabeth and Zechariah and the prediction of the birth of John the Baptist.

But John is unique in introducing Jesus to us. He takes us as far back as we can think. To the beginning, before the creation of the world: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning.'

John takes us back beyond creation to remind us that Jesus has been God the Son from eternity, that he existed before his birth, and is coequal with God the Father.


We see Jesus as the Eternal Word, who existed in the beginning, not because he had a beginning as a creature, but because he is eternal. He is God and he is God with us. In John 8:58, John records Jesus' very own words; 'Before Abraham was. I am.'

This Eternal Word, who was with God and was God, chose to enter our world as a helpless baby. He, the Word, spoke the world into existence. He came to live among us, to be one with us.

And so, as we journey through Advent, what is it that Jesus, who is the Word who spoke the world into existence, can speak into your life in this season?

Dear God, we enter into this Advent season waiting to celebrate the coming of your eternal Son into our world. We stand in awe of you. We thank you, Jesus, who is the I Am, the Alpha and the Omega, for your unconditional love and for coming to live with us. Draw us closer to you this Advent season. May we be filled with worship and adoration towards you this Christmas as we celebrate your eternal love for us.

This Christmas, we acknowledge the true Gift of Christmas – the birth of lesus Christ.

During this season, we can enjoy the incredible Christmas displays and decorations; let us remember and reflect on the One who formed the stars and brought life, abundant life into this world, Jesus. Jesus, the Creator, invites us to look upon Him, not as a display in a store window to capture our imagination, but as our Redeemer and Friend.

# What am I focusing on this Christmas season and how is this demonstrating courageous faith?

Father God, I praise you for your faithfulness from generation to generation. Your grace, strength, and love are so evident in this season through your son, Jesus Christ. Keep my eyes focused on Jesus – the most powerful display of love, who humbly entered His creation to redeem us.

times He becomes Life. For everyone. Because 'his love endures forever' (I Chronicles 16:32).



Jesus said: 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but have the light of life' (John 8:12).



# He is Immanuel.

John 1:14, Matthew 1:18-25, Isaiah 7:14 and 2 Corinthians 9:15

It's Christmas day and we have so much to celebrate!

God is with us – He is Immanuel.

In John 1:14, we read that 'The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us...' The New Christian Version renders the same verse like this: 'The word became a human and lived among us.'

God became a man – flesh and blood. For thirty-three years he lives as a human on earth, he feels everything that you and I feel. The early disciples saw him and heard from his mouth what he had to teach. He was real and personal, not abstract and remote, not distant or uncaring.

This is our eternal God, the one who reaches into humanity and is within reach of us ordinary human beings. This is our eternal God, the one who is touchable, with a face with human form in the here and now.

This birth, the birth of Jesus, is the culmination of the prophecy foretold by Isaiah hundreds of years before. God has become a human!

It seems difficult at times for us to comprehend the magnitude of this gift to each of us. To fully grasp the extent of this grace, this love for humankind. God is with us.

Even today, as people struggle to understand who God is and what God is like, we have assurance through his word and through our own experience of him that we can point to Jesus and say, 'Here he is'!

On this Christmas Day, we recognise the truth that God is with us — whatever we face, wherever we are, his presence is with us. As we celebrate the birth of our Saviour, Immanuel, God with us, may we join with the Apostle Paul in declaring:

'Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!' (2 Corinthians 9:15)

We receive a gift we could not earn nor could ever deserve – what an extravagant gift from God.
